What is Homelessness?

The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) defines a person who is homeless as:

- a) living in a place not designed or ordinarily used as a regular sleeping accommodation for humans (i.e., abandoned buildings, cars, parks, under bridges, bus stops, etc.); and
- b) living in emergency shelters and transitional housing projects.

Why Does HUD Matter?

- The Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) releases the Annual Homeless Assessment Report to Congress (AHAR). The Point-in Time (PIT) offers a snapshot of homelessness on as single night — both sheltered & unsheltered.
- Counties & Cities that receive federal funds are required to participate in the PIT Count to continue receiving federal funding for homeless assistance programs.
- In 2018, Riverside County Continuum of Care received **\$10.1M** from HUD and **\$11M** from the State for Homeless Programs & Services.





Homeless Population Trend




Race & Ethnicity





Sheltered Household Composition






PIT Count Trend





COUNTY-WIDE INCREASES IN 2019 PIT COUNT

COUNTY-WIDE INCREASES ATTRIBUTED TO:

- Enhanced count methodology which covered a wider area
- Increased efficiency – Mobile App Survey 123
- Revised survey questions to follow HUD guidelines (i.e. chronic homeless, domestic violence, etc.)
- Planned targeting of encampments
- Increased number of volunteers (more than 700 County-wide, 45 in Corona)
- Increased participation from City leadership
- Alcoa Dike Project – displaced homeless residents (Corona specific)

OPTIONS AVAILABLE TO CORONA

- Emergency shelters are allowed “by right” in the M-1 zone.

17.44.130 Standards for emergency shelters in the M-1 zone.

The Community Development Director shall have the authority to review and approve emergency shelters to be located in the M-1 Zone. The review shall be ministerial. To be approved, the proposed emergency shelter must be demonstrated to meet the following standards, as permitted by Cal.

Gov't Code § 65583(a)(4):

- (A) The proposed shelter is in conformance with the applicable Building and Fire Codes;
 - (B) The proposed shelter use is consistent with the General Plan and zoning of the proposed site;
 - (C) The maximum number of beds or persons permitted to be served nightly by the facility shall be based upon California Building Code Occupancy limits for the building in which the shelter is to be housed or developed;
 - (D) Off-street parking shall be provided in accordance with § [17.76.030](#)(A)(2) of this code (one space per staff member of largest shift, plus one space per 12 beds, plus two guest spaces);
 - (E) On-site management shall be provided on a 24 hour basis;
 - (F) The shelter shall be located no less than 300 feet from any other shelter facility, as permitted by Cal. Gov't Code § 65583(a)(4);
 - (G) The length of stay for any client shall be a maximum of 180 nights in any one year period;
 - (H) Adequate exterior lighting must be provided and maintained for security purposes.

INTRODUCTION

Under California Government Code Section 54220-54232, Riverside County Transportation Commission (RCTC) can offer properties for sale to private individuals and companies when certain conditions are met. Prior to the disposition of property, RCTC must determine whether the property is needed for any future use and declare the property surplus. A 60-day public agency notification period is initiated for City and County agencies within the jurisdiction of the parcels. If no interest is expressed, RCTC may offer the surplus property to the open market. These conditions were met and RCTC hereby solicits requests for offers on real property located at 1195 Pomona Road, Corona, CA.

GENERAL REQUIREMENTS

A) DESCRIPTION OF PROPERTY

The Property is located at 1195 Pomona Road in the city of Corona and consists of approximately 20,111 ± square feet/0.46 acres. The Assessor Parcel Number related to the sale is: 118-160-021. The Property is more particularly described in Attachment "A" - Property Summary.

OPTIONS AVAILABLE TO CORONA - Continued

- **ARMORY:**

- Based on our historic zoning maps going back to 1972, the city park property was previously zoned R-3 (high density residential).
- The Downtown Specific Plan was created in 1998; the city changed the land use to City Park to be consistent with the actual use of the property. The armory was a pre-existing use at that time so it just became a non-conforming use on the property when the zone was changed.
- For the armory to become an emergency shelter, the city would need to:
 1. Amend the General Plan to General Industrial
 2. Amend the specific plan to a land use suitable for a shelter. The specific plan does not have a M-1 zone, but has a Business Park zone.
 3. City Park is on one parcel.
 - The city would need to create a separate parcel for the armory separate from the park in order to establish a different zoning on the armory parcel.
- The council would need to decide if they are receptive to amending the plan to change this portion to Business Park and allow a shelter by right.

ARMORY

- Armory was built in the 1940s and has various challenges:
 - Asbestos
 - Lead based paint
 - Storage of military munitions/equipment – soil testing required and potential mitigation
 - No running water
 - Seismic retrofit
 - ADA compliance
