Ask

That the Council provide direction on how to track Conflict of Interest requirements enacted through SB 1439.



SB 1439 Campaign Contributions

- → Effective January 1, 2023; does not apply to contributions received in 2022
- → Prohibits accepting, soliciting, or directing a campaign contribution over \$250 if the donor is involved in a proceeding involving a license, permit, or other entitlement for use, including a contract award that is pending before the agency
- → Requires City Council members to recuse themselves from such proceeding if the member has received a contribution within the previous 12 months



Options

Options Presented at April 5, 2023 COTW

- **Option 1:** Elected Officials track their respective Conflict of Interest and recuse themselves
- **Option 2:** City staff tracks Conflict of Interest and prepares potential Conflict of Interest memorandum prior to each meeting

Additional Options for Consideration

- **Option 2A:** City staff prepares a potential Conflict of Interest memorandum based on the Disclosure of Campaign Contributions and the Conflict of Interest forms (similar to RCTC's process)
- **Option 3:** City staff prepares a potential Conflict of Interest memorandum solely based on the agencies listed on the agenda
- **Option 4**: City staff highlights the agencies listed on the agenda



Options (Presented on April 5)

- Option 1: Elected Officials track their respective Conflict of Interest and recuse themselves
- Option 2: City staff tracks Conflict of Interest and prepares potential Conflict of Interest memorandum prior to each meeting
 - Requires the Planning and Development Department and Purchasing Division staff to provide the applicant/bidder with a Disclosure of Campaign Contributions Form
 - The applicant/bidder will disclose the contributions they have made to any Elected Official involving a license, permit or other entitlement for use, including a contract award
 - Council Members submit a Conflict of Interest Form



Additional Options

- → Option 2A: City staff to prepare a potential Conflict of Interest memorandum based on the Disclosure of Campaign Contributions Form and the Conflict of Interest Form
 - Disclosure of Campaign Contributions forms received from the Purchasing Division
 - Conflict of Interest forms received submitted by the Council Members
 - → This option is similar to RCTC's process



Additional Options (cont.)

- → Option 3: City staff to prepare a potential Conflict of Interest Memorandum solely based on the agencies listed on the agenda
 - → Based on the agencies listed on the Recommended Action
- → Option 4: City staff to highlight the agencies listed on the agenda
